### What is commons.shareok.org?

It is an open access repository built to showcase and archive outstanding student research, scholarship, and creative work produced at The University of Oklahoma. Works may include: academic research papers and projects, student newspapers and journals, capstone projects, award-winning works, refereed works, and more.

### Why should I submit my work to commons.shareok.org?<sup>1</sup>

- It provides a forum for student work that would otherwise be hard to locate or would be completely unavailable to the general public.
- It provides a unique, stable URL for each work that can be cited and included in future job or graduate school applications.
- Every work is archived and preserved at no cost to students or to their home departments.
- Submissions are indexed and available on the Web immediately after approval.
- Text-based materials are indexed automatically so that the full text is searchable.
- Google, Google Scholar and other similar services routinely harvest the information and add links to their indexes so that works submitted here may also be found through searches on the open Web.

### Will I retain copyright of my submission?

Authors who submit materials to commons.shareok.org retain their copyright. In order for commons.shareok.org to reproduce, translate, and distribute your submission worldwide, you must sign a [Non-Exclusive Deposit License](#). A non-exclusive license allows authors to freely republish their work. Authors may determine the conditions of re-use of their materials by selecting a [Creative Commons License](#).

Creative Commons provides alternative licenses whereby you can release some of the rights you are automatically assigned by copyright law.

The most open license is the Attribution license. With this you receive the greatest exposure for your work, since allows your work to be distributed anywhere or modified to someone's specific needs, while still giving you credit for its creation.

Other Creative Commons license choices specify whether you allow commercial use of the work, whether you allow modifications of the work, and whether you allow derivative works to be created based on your work.

A Creative Commons license is optional, and authors can choose to retain full copyright.
