Howard, Walter Alonzo (1883–1970). Papers, 1919–1928. 1 foot.

Physician. Correspondence (1924–1927) from Howard's tenure as secretary-treasurer of the Rogers County (Oklahoma) Medical Society; military examination records (1920–1927) created while Howard was a designated medical examiner for the U.S. Veterans Bureau; and personal correspondence (1918–1927) regarding Howard's activities with the American Legion and the American Red Cross, along with reprints of articles on medical subjects.
