The family-related collection materials pertain to his father, Kiowa, Comanche and Wichita Agency physician Charles Robinson Hume; his mother, Anadarko photographer Annette Ross Hume; and his brother, Minco, Oklahoma, physician Raymond Robinson Hume.

Biographical Note:

Carleton Ross Hume, who along with Roy P. Stoops made up the first graduating class of the University of Oklahoma in 1898. He was born at Tontogany, Ohio, in 1878. He was the son of Charles Robinson Hume and Annette Ross Hume. The Humes moved to Anadarko, Oklahoma Territory, in December of 1890, when Dr. Hume was appointed as government physician to the Anadarko Indian Agency. C. Ross Hume later served as attorney for the Caddo Nation, and a judge in Anadarko.
